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Meeting Minutes for January 10, 2018

Welcome and Introductions

1. Call to Order and Comments by the Chair

Chair Terry Ogawa opened the meeting of the Policy Roundtable for Child Care and Development (Roundtable) at approximately 10:05 a.m. with self-introductions.

2. Approval of December 13, 2017 Minutes

Upon a motion by Ms. Terri Nishimura and second by Mr. Boris Villacorta, the minutes for December 13, 2017 were approved. Dr. Karla Pleitéz Howell abstained.

Strategic Priority Work

3. Follow-up on Old Business

a. Strategic Planning Progress - Overview of Workgroup Screener

Chair Ogawa reminded the Roundtable of the ongoing strategic planning process that began with the retreat held in August 2017. A comprehensive plan is expected to encompass and be aligned with the work and strategies of all early care and education related bodies and offices of the County (i.e., the Child Care Planning Committee (Planning Committee) and the Office for the Advancement of Early Care and Education (OAECE)). First 5 LA will support this effort by funding a consultant who will help guide the development of the strategic plan. Vice Chair Jackie Majors further elaborated that the operational improvement ideas received from the retreat are already being implemented while additional work is pending with the development of the strategic plan.

4. Workgroup Reports

a. Subsidized Child Care System – CalWORKs Stage 1 Child Care (Stage 1 Workgroup)

Vice Chair Majors provided some background information as to the issues and concerns that led to forming the CalWORKs Stage 1 Child Care Workgroup. She shared screening questions to solicit the interest of the experts who could join the workgroup. The expected outcomes of this workgroup are to identify key obstacles to access subsidized child care, to determine the access issue with the highest priority, and to frame policy recommendations that would increase access. Ms. Michele Sartell added that the workgroup may benefit from the needs assessment that was conducted to identify, among many things, the barriers to subsidized early care and education services. She also noted that the Planning Committee has an established Access/Inclusion workgroup, and she suggested bridging the two workgroups since they both have similar objectives.



b. Los Angeles (LA) County’s Prevention Plan – Improving Access to Early Care and Education Programs (Prevention Workgroup)

Chair Ogawa noted that Dr. Jacquelyn McCroskey has held the initial orientation meeting with the workgroup and other meetings will be scheduled.

5. Priority Work Updates

a. Board of Supervisor Designees - Proposed Board Communication Document

Ms. Karla Pleitéz Howell provided an overview of the Roundtable’s recent efforts to strategize and standardize the regular communications between the Board Designees and their respective offices through the proposed Board Communication Document. Feedback and questions were discussed around the challenge of exchanging information to and from the Board offices in real-time considering the time needed to prepare or approve the minutes of each Roundtable meeting. Attending Children’s Deputies Ms. Emily Williams and Ms. Maral Karaccusian highlighted that it would be helpful for the Children’s Deputies to receive timely and relative information in preparation of any related issue going before the Board. Further discussions addressed the possibility and need for the Roundtable’s involvement in efforts such as CalWORKs Stage 1 Child Care contract negotiations and contributing to the Statement of Work for this contract.

b. Roundtable Members

i. OAECE

Mr. Harvey Kawasaki provided updates on the OAECE’s strategic downsizing and the proposal to outsource of the Investing in Early Educators Stipend Program contract. Mr. Kawasaki also noted efforts underway to fill the Director position for the OAECE.

Public Policy

a. Presentation: Portrait of Los Angeles County

Ms. Cheryl Wold presented on A Portrait of LA County, which is “an exploration of how LA County residents are faring in terms of well-being and equity. It examines well-being and access to opportunity using the human development framework and index, presenting American Human Development Index scores for LA County places and demographic groups and exploring a range of critical issues, including health, education, living standards, environmental justice, housing, homelessness, violence, and inequality”.¹ The full report can be found at www.measureofamerica.org/los-angeles-county. Questions arose around the possibility of using existing County data to supplement the data from the study. Chair Ogawa requested for Ms. Wold to come back to one of the future Roundtable meetings to have a group discussion on how the Roundtable can capitalize on such data collection efforts.

b. Questions to the Gubernatorial Candidates’ Forum – Empowerment Congress

Dr. Sharoni Little noted that questions from the Roundtable related to early care and education were submitted for consideration at the Forum. However, there is not a guarantee that it will be included in the priority list of the questions to be asked of the gubernatorial candidates.

Alternatively, she suggested that Roundtable representatives attending the summit and ask the pre-formulated questions during public comments.

c. State Legislative Updates – Second Session of 2017-18

Mr. Dean Tagawa noted that the legislature reconvened for the second session of 2017-18 on Tuesday, January 2nd. Work is underway to identify the reintroduction of existing bills and the introduction of new bills. AB 11, introduced by Assembly Member Kevin McCarty last session, has been gutted and amended to require developmental screenings under the Early Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment program for children birth to three years old. AB 1754, introduced by a team of Assembly Members including McCarty, Friedman, Garcia and Bonta, would create the Pre-K for All Act of 2018 and require the state to provide all four year children of low-income families with access to early care and education programs.

d. Governor’s Budget Proposal for Fiscal Year 2018-19

Mr. Tagawa announced that Governor Brown was scheduled to introduce his proposed budget for fiscal year 2018-19 at the same time as the meeting. OAECE staff will peruse the budget summary and budget bills as they become available and prepare a report for the February meeting. In addition, the Joint Committee on Legislation will review the proposed budget items at its meeting later in the month and potentially return with proposed recommendations for elevating to the Board.

e. Federal Legislation and Spending Priorities – Child Care and Development

Mr. Tagawa referred to the handouts prepared by the Center for Law and Social Policy (CLASP) on Senators Sanders and Warren’s proposal to increase the appropriation for the federal Child Care and Development Block Grant. The additional funding would help states expand services to additional children and implement the requirements to improve the health, safety and quality of child care.

Wrap Up

6. Announcements and Public Comments

- Ms. Fran Chasen announced the release of Infant Development Association’s Annual Update on California Early Start and Early Care and Education Services scheduled for January 22nd. She added that the State of California’s Legislative Analyst Office released a report entitled *Evaluating California’s System for Serving Infants and Toddlers with Special Needs*; the authors of this report will be participating in the program panel. She also reminded that the Early Learning Advocacy Day is coming up on March 1st.
- Ms. Nellie Ríos-Parra announced the upcoming public hearing on the Revised Local Planning Council Funding Priorities on Child Care and Development Services scheduled for Wednesday, February 7, 2018. Ms. Ríos-Parra also noted Quality and Workforce Work Groups are considering undertaking a couple of activities – developing an economic model focused on the cost of operating a quality program, and creating a model compensation scale aligned with the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- Dr. Dawn Kurtz announced Child360’s open house event scheduled for February 1st. *Since the meeting, Child360 postponed the open house to a yet to be determined date.*

PRIORITY SETTING

- Data analyzed using Priority 1, 2 and 3 number and percent thresholds and methodology
- Methodology depends on County size – Los Angeles County uses methodology for counties with over five million residents
- ... and contract type, e.g. center – infants and toddlers (CCTR), California State Preschool (CSPP), center – school age (CCTR)

PRIORITY SETTING – All Program Types

Priority 1: Zip code qualifies when there are 50% or more eligible children unserved AND more than 1,500 eligible children unserved

Priority 2: Zip code qualifies when there are 50% or more eligible children unserved AND more than 750 eligible children unserved

Priority 3: Zip code qualifies when there are 50% or more eligible children unserved AND more than 500 eligible children unserved



PRIORITY 3 OPTIONS

Option 1: A zip code qualifies as Priority 3 when there are 50% or more eligible children underserved and there are more than 500 children underserved.

Option 2: All other zip codes in the county.

Option 3: No other zip codes in the county.

March – Approval of County Superintendent of Schools

March – early May – Submit to County process for approval by Board of Supervisors

CONTEXT FOR BUDGET PROPOSALS

- Continues to promote fiscal restraint
 - A future recession is inevitable
 - Uncertain federal budget and potential shifting health and entitlement program costs to states
 - Commitment to a solid state Rainy Day Fund

- Supports ongoing priorities
 - Increased funding for public education to achieve 100% implementation of LCFF
 - Increased funding for higher education
 - Funding activities that combat climate change
 - Funding for state and local transportation infrastructure
 - Reducing debts and liabilities

EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION ITEMS

- No proposed changes or reforms to the infrastructure
- Investments mostly limited to multi-year plan to increase spaces for preschool age children and raise reimbursement rates as specified in the 2016-17 budget agreement



EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION ITEMS – REIMBURSEMENT RATES

- Increases the Standard Reimbursement Rate (SRR) to California Department of Education center-based programs serving low-income families by approximately 2.8% effective July 1, 2018.
- Permanently extends the temporary Regional Market Rate (RMR) hold harmless provision so that no provider accepting vouchers to serve low-income families receives less than received in 2015-16 effective 2019-20.



EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION ITEMS – CALIFORNIA STATE PRESCHOOL PROGRAM EXPANSION

- Fully implements the multi-year agreement to increase access to full-day State Preschool by 2,859 slots for Local Education Agencies (LEAs) as of April 1, 2018

- **NEW:** Establishes the Inclusive Education Expansion Program for children ages birth to five years old
 - Targets low-income communities and areas with relatively low access to services
 - Competitive grant program to organizations committing to all children, especially those with disabilities

INCLUSIVE EARLY EDUCATION EXPANSION PROGRAM FOR LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCIES (LEAs) – TRAILER BILL LANGUAGE

- Makes \$125M available for encumbrance until June 30, 2023
- CDE's Special Education and Early Education and Support Divisions to develop criteria for selection of grantees
- Must increase access to subsidized inclusive ECE programs for children birth to five in high need communities based on needs assessment
- Programs must be sustainable beyond grant period
- Requires 33% local match; may include in-kind resources
- LEA may apply on behalf of a consortium of providers within program area
- Grants are competitive and priority for funding to applicants with documented need for expanded access to inclusive ECE, in low-income communities, and represent a consortium of local partners
- Grants may be used for one-time infrastructure costs, i.e. adaptive facility renovations, adaptive equipment, and professional development
- Must commit to providing program data



EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION ITEMS – OTHER ADJUSTMENTS

- **COLA and Growth:** Makes a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) of 2.51%; adjusts growth by -.48%
- **CalWORKs Child Care:** Provides a net increase of funding for CalWORKs Stage 2 and Stage 3 Child Care to reflect case adjustments

HOME VISITATION - CALWORKS

- Invests \$26.7 million for a voluntary home visiting pilot program through January 1, 2024
 - Targeted to first-time parents in the CalWORKs program
 - Program intent: help parents achieve self-sufficiency by improving family engagement practices; supporting the healthy development of young children living in poverty; and preparing parents for employment
- Trailer Bill Language – CalWORKs Home Visiting Initiative
 - Voluntary program to support health outcomes for pregnant woman or first-time parent/caretaker under 25 years old of child under 24 months of age
 - Activities to include case management and evidence-based home visiting for up to 24 months, resources/referrals to prenatal, infant and toddler care, developmental screening and assessments, etc.
 - Counties may opt-in; participate in data collection related to outcomes

WHAT'S MISSING?

- Investments to increase subsidized services to meet the needs of families with infants and toddlers
- Reimbursement rates that reflect the true cost of operating (quality) programs
- Commitment to ensure more programs – centers and family child care homes serving children birth to five – can participate in QRIS

GOVERNOR INTRODUCES PROPOSED BUDGET – FY 2018-19 EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION ITEMS

Overview

Governor Jerry Brown released his proposed budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-19 on January 10, 2018. The Governor's budget continues to promote fiscal restraint to prepare for the next recession and in response to uncertainty related to the federal budget that may result in shifts to health and entitlement program costs to states. Concurrently, the Governor increases investments in ongoing priorities, including public education, higher education, climate change activities, state and local infrastructure, and reducing debts and liabilities.

The Governor's proposals for early care and education build upon recent restorations to programs that experienced deep cuts during the Great Recession by continuing modest increases in access for children birth to five years old and reimbursement rates to programs serving low-income families. On a related note, the Governor's budget invests in home visitation services for first-time parents participating in the CalWORKs program.

On January 30, 2018, the Department of Finance posted Trailer Bill Language to specify implementation of California State Budget Bill. This analysis captures both the Governor's budget proposals for early care and education and relevant implementing language as contained in the Omnibus Education Trailer Bill and the trailer bill for the CalWORKs Home Visitation Initiative.

Table 1 on page 4 specifies the funding allocations by program type for FY 2018-19 compared to the Budget Act of 2017-18.

Child Care and Development Items

Increases to the Reimbursement Rates

- Increases the Standard Reimbursement Rate (SRR) to California Department of Education-contracted center-based programs serving low-income families by approximately 2.8 percent as of July 1, 2018 (\$31.6 million Proposition 98 General Fund and \$16.1 million non-Proposition General Fund).
- Permanently extends the temporary Regional Market Rate (RMR) hold harmless provision so that no provider accepting vouchers to serve low income families receives less than they received in 2015-16 beginning 2019-20.

California State Preschool Program (CSPP) Expansion

- Fully implements the multi-year agreement to increase access to full-day State Preschool by 2,859 slots for Local Education Agencies (LEAs) as of April 1, 2019 (\$28.4 million Proposition 98 General Fund).

Inclusive Early Education Expansion Program for Local Education Agencies (LEAs)

- Establishes the Inclusive Early Education Expansion Program to increase the availability of inclusive early care and education for children ages birth to five years old, especially in low-income communities and in areas with relatively low access to care. The competitive grant program would require successful program recipients to commit that all children benefiting

from the funds, especially those with disabilities, have access to appropriate settings that support their educational and developmental growth (\$125 million one-time Proposition 98 General Fund and \$142.2 million one-time federal TANF).

- Trailer Bill Language specifies implementation of the program as follows:
 - Requires the California Department of Education's Special Education and Early Education and Support Divisions to develop criteria for the selection of grantees.
 - Grantees must increase access to subsidized inclusive early care and education programs for children birth to five in high need communities based on local needs assessments.
 - Programs must have a plan for sustainability beyond the grant period.
 - Requires a 33 percent local match, which may include in-kind resources.
 - LEAs may apply on behalf of a consortium of providers within the program area.
 - Grants are competitive and priority for funding will go to applicants with a documented need for expanded access to inclusive early care and education, applicants in low-income communities, and applicants that represent a consortium of local partners.
 - Grants may be used for one-time infrastructure costs, such as adaptive facility renovations, adaptive equipment, and professional development.
 - Grantees must commit to providing program data

Other Adjustments

- Provides a net increase of funding for CalWORKs Stage 2 and Stage 3 Child Care to reflect case adjustments (\$5.2 million non-Proposition 98 General Fund).
- Makes a cost of living adjustment (COLA) of 2.51 percent for a total of nearly \$50 million for all early care and education program.

Home Visitation - CalWORKs

- Invests \$26.7 million for a voluntary Home Visiting pilot program, which will continue through 2021 for young, first-time parents in the CalWORKs program. The program is intended to help parents achieve self-sufficiency by improving family engagement practices; supporting healthy development of young children living in poverty; and preparing parents for employment. A total of \$158.5 million in one-time TANF funds is being reserved for the pilot's total costs through calendar year 2021.
- According to trailer bill language, the Legislature would establish the CalWORKs Home Visitation Initiative as a voluntary program to support healthy outcomes for pregnant and parenting women and infants born into poverty. The trailer language further describes the elements of the program as follows:

- Operate as a voluntary program to support healthy outcomes for pregnant women or first-time parent/caretakers under 25 years old of children under 24 months of age.
- Would include the following activities: case management and evidence-based home visiting for up to 24 months; resources/referrals to prenatal, infant and toddler care; developmental screening and assessments; infant and child nutrition; parent education, parent and child interaction, child development and child care; and job readiness and barrier removal.
- Would require home visitors to encourage participants to enroll their child in a high quality early learning setting or participate in playgroups or other early learning enrichment activities. Parent participation in early learning activities would county towards allowable activities under a welfare-to-work plan.
- Counties may opt-in; would require participating counties to collect outcome related data and work with an independent, research-based institution to establish outcome measurements.

An author may move a bill to the inactive file, and move it off the inactive file at a later date. During the final weeks of the legislative session, measures may be moved there by the leadership as a method of encouraging authors to take up their bills promptly. |

Pregnant and Incarcerated Women and Girls

Across the United States, more than 200,000 women (including gender non-conforming people who are being housed in women’s facilities) are living in prison or jail. Thousands of these women are pregnant. Pregnancies among incarcerated women are often unplanned and high-risk, and are compromised by a lack of prenatal care, poor nutrition, domestic violence, mental illness, and drug and alcohol abuse. Whether an incarcerated woman or girl decides to continue her pregnancy to term or have an abortion, she has a right to obtain medical care. Medical care for incarcerated individuals is a constitutional and human right. Nevertheless, pregnant and incarcerated women and girls often have limited access to the care they and their babies need both pre- and postpartum. These women and girls often live in poor conditions leading up to and during their births, and are forced to relinquish their babies while still nursing and bonding with their newborn.

Across the nation, similar matters have been addressed in various lawsuits. For

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example, last year, a woman sued the Milwaukee County jail, alleging that deputies refused to unchain her while she was giving birth because of a jail policy requiring inmates to remain shackled while they're hospitalized, regardless of the circumstances. In another federal lawsuit involving Allegheny County, the complaint demanded that jail administrators immediately stop placing pregnant women in solitary confinement and adhere to constitutional obligations for health and safety of pregnant women, including providing a healthy diet, prenatal vitamins and necessary supplements. In 2016, the National Association of Women Judges declared conditions for pregnant women in the Metropolitan Detention Center in Brooklyn “unconscionable,” and concluded the Detention Center was in violation of the ABA Standards on Treatment of Prisoners and the UN Standard Minimum Rules for the Treatment of Prisoners.

Other jurisdictions are forming creative solutions to the need for postpartum women to care for their babies while still incarcerated. For example, at Bedford Hills Correctional Facility for Women, established in 1901, new mothers live with their infant children for up to 18 months. Although the individual rooms still have bars on the windows, the mothers in the program share their living space with a crib and their child. Mary Byrne, a Columbia University researcher, has spent years studying mothers and children who started life in Bedford Hills. Her research indicates that the children formed critical attachments to their mothers and that they were no different from children raised entirely outside of prison.

Despite these strides, pregnant women and girls in Los Angeles County face challenging circumstances. In one example, a pregnant 16-year-old was picked up on a warrant and placed at the Central Juvenile Hall. Within a few days, she delivered her

baby at LAC+USC Medical Center. The baby remained hospitalized, while the minor mother was returned to placement at Central Juvenile Hall pending her upcoming court date. Women in the jails frequently report delayed access to health care despite pregnancy and other high-risk conditions. Current data also shows that an increasing percentage of incarcerated pregnant women have mental illness diagnoses of varying degrees of severity and stability. Their physical and mental health needs require even more sensitivity and sophistication, which can challenge resources and housing options within custodial facilities. To this end, on February 2, 2018, the Inspector General provided a report of services and programs offered to pregnant prisoners and mothers at the Century Regional Detention Facility, as instructed at the November 14, 2017 Board meeting. That report raises several concerns and recommendations which are referenced, herein. As a County, we must address these matters with more sensitivity to the dignity of physical and emotional needs of the mother and her baby.

WE, THEREFORE MOVE, that the Department of Health Services (Correctional Health Services/Juvenile Court Health Services) and Sheriff's Department, in collaboration with the Office of Diversion and Reentry, Probation Department, Department of Mental Health, Department of Children and Family Services, District Attorney, Public Defender, Alternate Public Defender and other stakeholders, such as the courts, report back in 90 days on the following:

Data

1. The number of pregnant women and girls in each respective department's custody during calendar year 2017, including de-identified information about their offenses and sentencing, and the number of pregnant women and girls

who delivered while in custody and an outline of their postpartum care, and who took custody of their newborns.

Health Care and Well-Being

2. Current policies addressing screening to determine pregnancy, recent child bearing, total number of children, and the necessity of prenatal health care, dental and mental health care, for both women and girls in each respective department's custody;
3. An update on policies and practices implemented to ensure pregnant women receive appropriate diets, including clean water, which are not impacted by changes in housing location, and options for additional out-of-cell time;
4. An outline of housing conditions (including food disposal and clean water availability) for pregnant and post-partum women and girls including available beds and bedding suited for pregnancy and post-partum care, and any restrictions based on criminal history, physical and mental health, behavior, or attitude;
5. An update on the implementation of Mama's Neighborhood program within CRDF, including when services began, eligibility criteria, number of women participating and rejected, the use of doulas or registered nurses in labor and delivery, and policies and practices on allowing family support during labor and delivery and/or communication with family and loved ones before, during, and after labor and delivery.

Parent-Child Relationship, Reentry and Reunification

6. For ABC, WISP and the lactation program, and any other programs available for pregnant and post-partum women and girls, details about how women and girls are notified of existing programs, determination of eligibility and participation, including actual numbers of participation of women and girls in each program in 2017, reasons for rejection, and options for expanding eligibility criteria and participation;
7. An update regarding the creation of a policy pertaining to contact allowed between new mothers and their newborns, postpartum, based on collaboration between medical, mental health, and custody personnel, with strong consideration of the mother's preferences.

Best Practices

8. An evaluation of best practices across the nation for health care, rehabilitative services, child care, postpartum and parenting programs for incarcerated pregnant and post-partum women and girls, and postpartum contraception access practices, and whether they have been or could be implemented in Los Angeles County;
9. Plans for training and ongoing professional development for Sheriff, Probation and other relevant clinical staff on the topics of pregnancy, prenatal care, post-partum care for inmates and their children.

Diversion

10. An analysis of all available options for diversion from incarceration, release pending trial and early release post-sentencing of all pregnant adults and youth in Los Angeles County custody;
11. An analysis of all available options for alternatives to custody with intensive mental health treatment for all pregnant adults and youth in Los Angeles County custody with high mental health acuity and/or who meet LPS criteria, and with appropriate substance use treatment for all pregnant adults and youth in Los Angeles County custody with substance use disorder.

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
